From October 19 to October 23, Cordaid and CSPPS organized a series of side-events in the lead-up to the 20th anniversary of UN resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security and in light of the United Nations Security Council Open Debate on October 29.

In the events, the varied panels shared their experiences and recommendations and a prominent take-away is that in the 20 years since the landmark resolution has been passed by the UNSCR, we have been witnessing progress on the implementation of women's involvement in peace and security issues, with increased attention for women's specific roles and needs in diverse conflict-affected settings.

However, the panel discussions also highlighted that one major issue around the WPS agenda is that it is often implemented in isolated programmes, and that the lack of the mainstreaming of the agenda means that it is still lagging behind. In moving forward, there needs to be international commitment to ensure we all embark upon a more inclusive and participatory process.
